

Dear Friends,

As we stand once again at the threshold of Christmas and the dawn of the New Year 2026, my heart is filled with gratitude and joy. This sacred season is always a time to pause, to remember, and to rejoice — to recall with affection those who have touched our lives with generosity and faith, and to renew our hope in the God who became one of us.

Christmas is a season when:

We remember people with love that is enduring;

We bless them with prayers that are heartfelt;

We thank them for gifts that have transformed lives;

And we wish them every grace that makes life beautiful in God's sight.

The year 2025, proclaimed as the **Jubilee Year with the theme "Pilgrims of Hope,"** invites us to renew our journey of faith with deeper commitment. The Cathedral of Mary Help of Christians, Kohima, has been designated as the **Jubilee Pilgrimage Church**. Many pilgrims from within and outside the Diocese have already visited and experienced the grace of this sacred year.

This year has also been marked by vibrant expressions of faith within our diocesan family. The **Regional Youth Convention** held from 27–30 June brought together over 2,000 young people from across Northeast India in a joyful celebration of faith, fellowship, and renewal. The **5th Edition of the Bishop Abraham Memorial Tournament** (30 September – 2 October) gathered more than 700 youth from our parishes, combining sportsmanship with spiritual enrichment. The **Commission for Education, Diocese of Kohima (CEDOK)**, organized an **Athletic Meet** that united hundreds of students from across the diocese in a spirit

of healthy competition and oneness. The **Annual Eucharistic Procession** on 26 October was another moment of grace, when hundreds of faithful came together to publicly witness to our faith in the Lord present in the Holy Eucharist. Our diocesan associations — the **Catholic Association of Nagaland (CAN)**, **Nagaland Catholic Women Association (NCWA)**, and **Nagaland Catholic Youth Movement (NCYM)** — have been active and steadfast in their apostolates. Numerous communities and institutions have celebrated Silver and Golden Jubilees this year — moments of thanksgiving that testify to God's enduring faithfulness across generations.

We also had our share of real challenges during the year. Our FCRA account is not yet renewed in spite of many attempts. During this year the monsoon was very heavy and prolonged, cutting off many roads even the National Highways, causing great hardship for transportation and communication. Two of our parishes had jeep accidents, which completely destroyed the vehicle, although miraculously there was no loss of human life.

Dear friends, Christmas is not merely an event to be celebrated but a truth to be lived — the truth that "*God so loved the world that He gave His only Son*" (John 3:16). Your love, faith, and generosity make this truth visible in our times. As we journey together into the Great Jubilee Year (2025), may we continue to be "*pilgrims of hope*," bearing Christ's light into every home and heart.

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." (Romans 15:13)

From the Editor's Desk

“Marching Toward Bethlehem: The Soldier’s Discipline and the Athlete’s Endurance in Advent”



Dear Readers,

As we enter the sacred season of Advent, the Church invites us not simply to prepare for a festive celebration, but to embark on a journey of deep spiritual renewal. Advent is a season of watchfulness, longing, and joyful expectation — a time of sacred training that shapes us into faithful disciples ready to receive Christ. Scripture beautifully compares our spiritual progress to the discipline of a soldier and the endurance of an athlete, reminding us that Christian life is an active pursuit, a mission that demands resilience, sacrifice, and unwavering commitment.

St. Paul exhorts us with striking clarity: *“Share in suffering like a good soldier of Christ Jesus”* (2 Tim 2:3), and again, *“Every athlete exercises self-control in all things... they do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable one”* (1 Cor 9:25). These images capture the heart of Advent. Like a soldier who keeps vigilant watch, we are called to remain spiritually awake and alert: *“Stay awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming”* (Mt 24:42). Advent trains us to sharpen our awareness of God’s presence, to resist complacency, and to renew our dedication to Christ’s mission.

The Fathers of the Church echo this call to readiness. St. Cyril of Jerusalem reminds us that our waiting is not passive, for *“we do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, far more glorious than the first.”* Our preparation, therefore, is both for the remembrance of Christ’s birth in Bethlehem and for His final coming in glory. This dual expectation demands disciplined hearts, cultivated in prayer, silence, and reflection.

Like an athlete who perseveres through strenuous training, Christians are invited to endure hardships with

courage. Spiritual maturity requires the willingness to be stretched and refined. St. Augustine’s words illuminate this truth: *“You grow by stretching. Do not run from the stretching that strengthens your soul.”* Through acts of charity, fasting, forgiveness, and self-denial, Advent becomes the spiritual gymnasium in which our hearts are widened to welcome the God who comes in humility. Pope Benedict XVI captures this beautifully: *“Advent is a journey toward Bethlehem. May we let ourselves be drawn by the light of God made man.”*

As we make this journey, we remember that Bethlehem is a place of simplicity. The crib is humble, the setting quiet, the signs subtle. Only a disciplined, attentive heart can recognize the King who comes in disarming gentleness. St. John Chrysostom captures the call of this season with profound simplicity: *“Let the soul be a living crib, ready and clean, for Christ to be born in.”*

As we stand on the threshold of this holy celebration, may the light of the newborn Christ scatter all darkness from our hearts and homes. May He strengthen us to be courageous soldiers of faith and tireless athletes of the Gospel. May His peace transform our families, His love bind our communities, and His presence guide our diocese toward deeper unity and holiness.

**Wishing you a blessed Advent and a joyous,
grace-filled Christmas!**

May the Christ Child be born anew in every heart, and may His hope, peace, and love continue to guide us into the New Year with renewed strength and unwavering faith.

Diocese Vocation Camp – II Held at Holy Cross Parish, Dimapur



The Diocese of Kohima successfully organized the Second Diocese Vocation Camp at Holy Cross Parish, Dimapur, from 3rd to 6th October 2025, under the inspiring theme, *“Here I am, Lord; send me”* (Isaiah 6:8). The four-day camp witnessed the enthusiastic participation of 182 children representing 20 parishes and centres of the Diocese. The programme was further enriched by the presence of 42 Religious Sisters from 23 different congregations and 16 priests from various religious congregations and the Diocese.

The camp commenced with an introductory session on the first day, during which Rev. Fr. Gwatilo Alex Tep, Diocese Vocation Promoter, introduced the priests, sisters, and participants, and warmly welcomed everyone. Rev. Fr. John P. M., Parish Priest of Holy Cross Church, Dimapur, extended the official words of welcome.

The inaugural Holy Eucharist was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Rolson SFX, marking a prayerful beginning to the camp, followed by an orientation rally for the children. The day’s formation sessions were animated by Rev. Fr. Daniel SDB, Vice Principal of Don Bosco Higher Secondary School, Dimapur, who spoke on the theme *“God Calls Ordinary People to Do Extraordinary Things.”* The second session was conducted by Rev. Fr. Renthungo Victor, Principal of Holy Cross Higher Secondary School, Dimapur, on the camp theme, *“Here I am, Lord; send me.”* Later, the vocation promoters and religious sisters met the boys and girls separately, introducing them to the charism and mission of their respective congregations. The first day also witnessed a solemn candlelight Rosary procession, creating a deeply prayerful atmosphere and entrusting the camp and its participants to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The second day of the camp was marked by the Holy Eucharist presided over by Most Rev. Dr. James Thoppil, Bishop of Kohima. Addressing the children after the Mass, the Bishop encouraged them to remain open to God’s call and to respond generously to His will. As a sign of spiritual encouragement, he presented a rosary to each participant. Subsequently, priests and religious sisters interacted with the children in separate groups, sharing insights into the charism and vocation of their congregations. At the end of the day, a discernment adoration was conducted by the SABS Sisters, offering the children a sacred time of prayer and silence to discern the congregation of their choice, guided by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

Throughout the camp, the participants engaged in various activities, including group games, singing, dancing, and faith-based video presentations prepared by the brothers. The boys were guided and accompanied by Regent Brothers Jerome Metha, Michael Humtsoe, James, and Sonilo from Good Shepherd Seminary, while the girls were cared for by the Bethany Sisters. The smooth conduct of the camp, including food and other logistical arrangements, was made possible through the dedicated efforts of Rev. Fr. John P. M., with the generous support of the parish youth, mothers, sisters, and brothers.

The Vocation Camp concluded on the morning of 6th October with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist presided over by Rev. Fr. Gwatilo Alex Tep, Diocese Vocation Promoter, followed by breakfast. The camp proved to be a spiritually enriching experience, helping the young participants to deepen their faith and attentiveness to God’s call, while fostering a renewed culture of vocations within the Diocese of Kohima.

Bishop Abraham Memorial Tournament Unites Nagaland's Catholic Youth in Sportsmanship and Faith



The 5th *Bishop Abraham Memorial Tournament (BAMT) 2025* was held from 30th September to 2nd October at St. Joseph's (Autonomous) College, Jakhama, bringing together hundreds of Catholic youth

from across Nagaland for a vibrant three-day celebration of sports, faith, and fellowship. Organized by the Nagaland Catholic Youth Movement (NCYM) and hosted by the Southern Angami Catholic Union (SACU), this year's tournament was held under the theme "*Run with Faith, Rise in Glory.*"

The inaugural ceremony was graced by Nosazol Charles, State Information Commissioner and Advisor to the Catholic Association of Nagaland (CAN), as the Special Guest, and Most Rev. Dr. James Thoppil, Bishop of Kohima, as the Guest of Honour. Charles recalled the inspiring leadership of Late Bishop Abraham Alangimattathil, SDB—the first Bishop of Kohima and founder of CAN—whose vision for youth and lay participation continues to guide the diocese. He urged young people to uphold the values of unity, discipline, and perseverance, both in sports and in life.

In his address, Bishop Thoppil commended the achievements of Catholic youth in academics and public service, announcing diocesan support for two students annually preparing for the Indian Civil Services. He encouraged the youth to pursue excellence, integrity, and leadership in every sphere of life.

A total of 58 teams—30 men's and 28 women's—participated in volleyball and tug-of-war events, including teams of priests and religious. The competitions promoted teamwork, discipline, and camaraderie. Winners in both volleyball categories received ₹ 50,000, with runners-up and semi-finalists receiving ₹ 30,000 and ₹ 10,000 respectively.

Results:

- *Men's Volleyball:* St. John Evangelist Church, Khonoma – Champions; St. Paul Church, Phesama – Runners-up.

- *Women's Volleyball:* St. Francis of Assisi Parish, Lazami – Champions; St. Francis de Sales, Tening – Runners-up.
- *Tug-of-War:* St. Xavier Parish, Kidima – First; St. John Evangelist Parish, Khonoma – Second; St. Joseph's Parish, Tseminyu – Third.

Individual awards recognized outstanding performance and discipline. Among the women, *Best Player* went to Mhiesimenuo Margaret (Khonoma), *Best Spiker* to Niuli Helena (Lazami), and *Best Setter* to Livitoli Agnes (Lazami), while *Best Discipline Team* was St. Joseph's Centre, Songlhuh. In the men's category, Mhiesilieto Edmund (Khonoma) won *Best Player*, Kekhrieselie Kevin (Phesama) *Best Spiker*, Mezhüse Martin (Khonoma) *Best Setter*, and Christ the King Centre, Phuvkiu *Best Discipline Team*.

The closing ceremony was graced by Col. Satya Narain of the 44 Mountain Brigade as Guest of Honour and Dr. John Seyiekhrietuo, State Nodal Officer of AYUSH and President of ACU, as Special Guest. Both emphasized sports as a means of personal growth and resilience. Auxiliary Bishop Jose Puthenveetil of Faridabad also lauded the unity and faith witnessed among the youth.

The tournament concluded with the lowering of the NCYM flag and a heartfelt vote of thanks by Veronica Nriame, NCYM General Secretary. The event reaffirmed the enduring legacy of Bishop Abraham—uniting Nagaland's Catholic youth in faith, sportsmanship, and joyful fellowship.

Tikhir Community Observes Tsonglak-nyi, Emphasises on Preservation of Tradition



The Tikhir community is celebrating Tsonglak-nyi under the theme "Pojuvilapeinümütsin vi-ei" meaning "Live culturally by tradition," at Kiusam Town from October 9 to 12, with the main celebration held on October 10.

Rev Fr Thomas Toretciu, in his exhortation on the theme, said that "living culturally by tradition" means embracing and practising one's heritage, values, beliefs, and customs. He emphasised the importance of passing down traditional knowledge and practices to younger generations through dance, music, art, and other creative expressions.



“Our culture is our identity, allowing good values to shape our beliefs,” he said, adding that cultural practices foster community cohesion and strengthen social bonds. He highlighted the values of sanctification, purity, and humility before God as the core of the community’s heritage.

“The feast reminds us of renewal, introspection, and the building of relationships within the community and with others,” he said. Highlighting the traditions of sharing food and caring for neighbours, he said these are beautiful values that must be preserved.

He also cautioned that if the Tsonglak-nyi tradition is not passed on, the community’s identity could fade. Urging the elders to guide the youth, he said the Tikhir people’s unique cultural fabric and heritage should continue to be learned and celebrated.

Speeches were delivered by Teachang, Committee Chairman; T. Thangpong, Head GB; S. Khesang, public leader; Muraimong, Head DB, Kiusam HQ; and MK Shukiu, who spoke on the history and purpose of Tsonglak-nyi.

The celebration began with a prayer led by P. Rangthong, Pastor of KTBC, and will conclude with a closing prayer by Samuel Kurak, Catechist of SJCKT. Contributions were made by dignitaries and attendees, followed by cultural dances and a community feast.

To mark the occasion, a football penalty shootout was organised by Hunter-11, with eight teams participating. The Young Stars team emerged as the winners.

According to an update, Rev. Dr. James Thoppil, Bishop of Kohima, attended as the special guest for the inaugural ceremony, while Dr. Johnny Ruangmei, joint executive officer, Nagaland State Disaster Management Authority (NSDMA), and ShashankPratap Singh, IAS, principal director of school education, Nagaland, attended the closing ceremony-cum-Teachers Award function as special guest and guest of honour, respectively, along with other dignitaries.



Celebrating the Canonization of Saint Maria Troncatti – LFS Kohima

My name is Maria Troncatti. I was born on 16 February 1883, in Corteno Golgi (Brescia), a town in Lombardy, to a large family. At the age of six, I received First Holy Communion. I was exuberant and sensitive towards the poor. Through the Salesian Bulletin, reading the lives of missionaries, I discovered my vocation, to become a Daughter of Mary Help of Christians (FMA) to bring joy of the Gospel to the ends of the world.



Overcoming the difficulties, I left home for Nizza Monferrato (Asti) on 15 October 1905, to prepare myself to say my “yes” to the Lord in the Salesian mission. I worked as a cook, assistant, and during the First World War, I took a course to become a Red Cross nurse in military hospitals where I served the sick. From Nizza in 1922, I left for Ecuador and, in 1925, I was sent as a “pioneer” in the new mission of the Amazon East among the indigenous population of the “Shuar” and white settlers. They called me familiarly “Madrecita” (which means loving mother) because I was always ready to meet them in their physical and spiritual needs. I took care of their lives. I have become an “artisan” of peace, always seeking ways of dialogue between two ethnic groups often in conflict. For their reconciliation, I offered my life. **(Taken from the Institute Archive)**

On 25 August 1969, while she was flying to Quito, the plane in which she was travelling crashed. Shuar and settlers, as brothers and sisters, said: “My Mother has died. A saint has died!”

The community of Little Flower Convent in Kohima prepared for the canonization of Blessed Maria Troncatti FMA with great fervor. Over a month-long period, the Community Sisters engaged in reading the book “*Beloved Jungles*”, a biography of Blessed Maria Troncatti daily during evening spiritual reading. On 12

October, 2025, a quiz competition on the life of Saint Maria Troncatti was organized in the hostel. The community Sisters, boarders and house girls observed a novena to Blessed Maria Troncatti. Following the novena, the community entered into a three-day Triduum — an intense phase of spiritual preparation. Prayer services were animated in line with the materials provided by the Province Mission Sector. Each day had a specific theme.

The celebrations unfolded over two days, highlighting two different aspect of community level celebration — parish and convent

19 October 2025 – Parish Celebration: At 8:30 a.m., a solemn Eucharistic celebration was held in collaboration with Mary Help of Christians Cathedral Parish, Kohima, marking the canonization day. The Holy Mass was presided over by Fr. Charellel Jacob, Chancellor of the Kohima Diocese. In her introductory address, Sr. Kethozeno Catherine FMA from Little Flower Training Centre - Novitiate Community reminded the congregation, “Today, she is being declared a Saint in the Catholic Church. Her legacy as an artisan of peace and reconciliation continues to inspire us to work towards peace and understanding.” The liturgy was animated by the Novitiate and Little Flower Convent communities.



After Mass, sweets and souvenirs were distributed to parishioners, adding a festive and joyful spirit to the occasion.

20 October 2025 – Two Communities hosted

James Thoppil, D.D., Bishop of Kohima, presided over the Eucharistic Mass, concelebrated by ten priests. Two Salesian clerics from Don Bosco, Kohima were also present. The felicitation program included a life sketch of Saint Maria Troncatti by the boarders interspersed with short and heart stirring songs which were composed

for the occasion, a poem by Fr. Chetissery Joseph SDB, Rector of Christ King Community, Kohima and an original song by the FMA Novices. Dr. Fr. C. P. Anto Receives Best Researcher Award at the 13th Indian Social Work Conference 2025

Dr. Fr. C. P. Anto, Founder-Principal of the North East Institute of Social Sciences and Research (NEISSR) and Founder-Director of Peace Channel, has been honored with the Best Researcher Award at the 13th Indian Social Work Conference 2025, organized by the National Association of Professional Social Workers in India (NAPSWI).

The conference was held from 6th to 8th November 2025 at Centurion University of Technology and

Management, Bhubaneswar, Odisha, in collaboration with the Odisha Professional Social Work Association and the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR). The National Association of Professional Social Workers in India (NAPSWI) is one of the largest member-based organizations of professional social workers in the country, with a network of over 1,000 colleges and universities offering social work education.

Dr. Fr. C. P. Anto's research presentation, titled "Advancing Peace and Conflict Transformation Studies in Social Work in India: Academic Innovation and Community Engagement through the Peace Channel," was selected for the award from among more than 100 research presentations, representing 23 states across 32 panels. The award was presented to Dr. Fr. Social Work Education," particularly in the context of recent curriculum revisions under the National Education Policy (NEP).

Blessing and Dedication of St. Thomas Church, Tamlu



The Catholic community of Tamlu witnessed a historic moment on 9 December 2025 with the blessing and dedication of the newly constructed St. Thomas Church by Most Rev. Dr. James Thoppil, Bishop of Kohima. The ceremony marked a significant milestone in the spiritual journey of the faithful in the region.

The solemn blessing was followed by the Holy Eucharist. In his introduction, Bishop James Thoppil congratulated the community for their unity and commitment in bringing the Church project to fruition. He expressed deep gratitude to all benefactors, with special mention of Deacon Dr. Sherman Kuek from Malaysia, whose generous contribution played a pivotal role in the completion of the Church building.

In his homily, the Bishop reflected on the biblical understanding of “Church,” noting that although Nagaland is often referred to as the “land of Churches” because of the prominent place Church buildings occupy in towns and villages, Scripture emphasises the living community of believers rather than physical structures.

Citing St. Paul’s letters to the Colossians and Ephesians, he reminded the faithful that “our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit.” He urged the community to commit themselves not only to building Church infrastructures but, more importantly, to nurturing the spiritual life of the community and individual souls by living the values of the Gospel.

During the felicitation programme, Bishop Thoppil recalled a significant chapter in the history of Catholicism in Tamlu. He noted that in 1910, Fr. Marcellinus Molaz, a Salvatorian missionary, arrived in Tamlu as the first Catholic missionary to Nagaland. Though he came with the hope of a rich spiritual harvest, the seeds he planted did not bear much fruit at the time. With the renewed efforts of the Capuchin missionaries today, the Bishop expressed hope that the community would fully embrace the opportunity before them. Using the metaphor of missing a train but catching the bus, he encouraged the faithful not to let the present moment pass by, but to “ride on with great zeal and commitment.” He also acknowledged and thanked the leaders of the community who remained steadfast in faith despite challenges.

The Bishop further congratulated Miss Lilly from the community for clearing the recent Nagaland Public Service Examination (NPSE) and a young man from the village who successfully joined the Indian Army, commending their achievements as sources of pride and inspiration for the community.

Catechist Hubert also shared his personal testimony, recalling that he began his mission in Tamlu on 23 December 1989, sent by the late Bishop Abraham, the first Bishop of Kohima. He expressed joy that through the hard work and cooperation of the Tamlu faithful, the Catholic community has now spread to three villages of the Phom community, marking significant pastoral progress.

In his note of gratitude, Fr. Justin Vineto thanked Bishop Thoppil for his continued support—spiritual, pastoral, and financial—as well as for his consistent visits and guidance. He fondly recalled the Bishop’s constant reminder: “In all things, have the purity of intent.” Fr. Vineto also extended heartfelt thanks to the pastors, GBs, chairman, community leaders, special invitees, and all who contributed to the success of the celebration.

J., Centre In-charge, extended a warm welcome to all the clergy, religious, invited guests, and faithful who gathered for the historic occasion.

The Thanksgiving Holy Eucharist, presided over by Bishop James Thoppil, was the spiritual highlight of the concluding day. In his introduction and homily, the Bishop described the Jubilee as a sacred moment to celebrate, reflect, repent, renew, and rededicate oneself to the mission of proclaiming the Lord’s favour, drawing inspiration from the biblical tradition of Jubilee.

Quoting the prophet Isaiah, he likened the journey of the Catholic Women Association to a desert that has blossomed, becoming a source of comfort and hope to many.

He commended the Catholic women of Mon for being the hands and feet of Christ, especially in a region where the Catholic presence is minimal. Through prayer, active participation in the liturgy, commitment to family apostolate, and charitable works, the Association has strengthened parish life and given a joyful witness to Christian womanhood.

Emphasizing that faith must be lived and not merely professed, the Bishop reminded the faithful that Christian values must permeate daily life and decisions. Citing St. James, he stressed that “faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead” (James 2:17), urging the women to build their lives on the strong foundation of Christ and His teachings. He encouraged them to remain beacons of hope, drawing strength from the Word of God and the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Rev. Fr. 

As the festive season draws near and the world starts to sparkle with lights, music, and holiday vibes, we're reminded once again of the season that touches our souls. Christmas isn't merely a date on the calendar or a cultural festivity but it is a holy invitation. An invitation to let Christ be born not just in Bethlehem, but in the quiet manger of our hearts.

I remember Christmas in my childhood village, nestled among hills and whispering pines. We didn't have any malls, no glittering reindeer, and definitely no internet countdowns. But we had something richer: warmth, faith, and togetherness.

Our Christmas started way before December 25. Weeks in advance, our home and hearts were buzzing with excitement. We came together not just as a family, but as a village of love - siblings, cousins, neighbors, and friends returning from distant towns. The air was alive with laughter, hugs, and the scent of pine and firewood.

Friends who had been away for months returned, bringing stories, laughter, and the kind of warmth only reunion can bring. Grandparents sat by the fire, their eyes twinkling as they shared tales of Christmases past - of miracles, of kindness, of faith that never fades. But the most beautiful preparation happened within. We prayed novenas with devotion, whispered personal prayers in the quiet of dawn, visited the sick with baskets of food and songs of comfort, and shared whatever little we had to those with even less. Charity wasn't a duty but it was our way of inviting Jesus to join us.

One evening, as I sat around the fire, a grandmother from our village returned to me and asked, “Do you know where Jesus is born?” I hesitated, unsure. She smiled, placed her hand gently over my heart, and said, “Here, every time you let go of grudges, every time you love without strings attached, every time you help someone out or share your meal - you're reborn, right here and now.”

That moment sparked something eternal within me. Since then, Christmas has never been just a date. It's a heartbeat. A whisper of grace. Every day, we're invited to let Christ's rebirth happen through acts of kindness, mercy and every act of love.

This Christmas, let us not merely remember Bethlehem's stable, but open the stable of our own hearts. For Christ longs not just to be born in history but in you, in me, in every heart that dares to love. As St. Ambrose says “*What good is it that Christ was born of Mary once in Bethlehem, if He is not born also by faith in our hearts?*” The heart is not just a muscle. It is a manger. A sanctuary. A throne. And Christ, the Prince of Peace, seeks no fancy palace rather just a humble heart ready to embrace Him with humility and hope.

The Catechism reminds us that the “*heart is not just emotion yet it is the sacred ground of truth and decision, deeper than impulse, where God longs to dwell*” (CCC 2563). Nelson Mandela tells us that a wise mind and a loving heart make an unstoppable force. Therefore, when we allow God's love to reside in us, our hearts become a place of encounter between God and human.

The Church invites us to be living mangers - cradles of Christ in a weary world. Pope Francis in his document “*Dilexit Nos*” writes “*His open heart has gone before us and waits for us, unconditionally, asking only to offer us his love and friendship.*” (12). The heart is presented not merely as a symbol, but as the spiritual dwelling where Christ is born and resides.

So this Christmas, don't just hang up lights on your place but let your heart shine it up with Mary's humility, Joseph's quiet obedience, the shepherds' awe, and the Magi's generous spirit. Because the greatest gift you can give the world is not wrapped in paper but in presence - a heart where Christ is born again, moment by moment, in every act of love. **Let your heart be His Bethlehem. Let your life be His light. Let your soul sing, “Glory to God in the highest!”**

In earlier times, Christmas was deeply spiritual. The season of Advent was a time for fasting, prayer, and preparation not just for a big meal, but for a birth. Families would come each evening to light candles, read scripture, and reflect on the journey of Mary and Joseph. Mass folks walked miles through the cold to gather in candlelit churches. The hymns were solemn, the prayers sincere and heartfelt. The real deal was about what we shared,

not what we got especially our hearts, our humility, our hope.

Today, Christmas has turned into a worldwide show. Cities light up in November, malls echo with pop carols, and social media is flooded with curated images of perfect trees and gourmet meals. The season is longer, louder, and often more commercial. There's nothing wrong with celebration and it's totally fine. Joy is a gift. But somewhere along the way, the birth of Jesus gets lost in the hustle and bustle of consumerism. We exchange gifts but forget the Gift. We decorate our homes but neglect to prepare our hearts.

In many places, Christmas is now more about shopping than shepherds, more focus on selfies than on the Savior. The nativity scene is replaced by inflatable snowmen, and the silence of the stable is drowned out by sales tunes.

So, how do we reclaim the heart of Christmas? How do we let Christ take root in our hearts in a world that often overlooks Him? It starts when we step outside ourselves and into someone else's world such as when we sit beside the lonely, feed the hungry, or just give someone a chance to share their story. In those moments, we become the like the soft straw in the manger, softening the world for Christ to rest again. It starts when we strip away the noise and glitter, choosing presence over presents, laughter over luxury, people over products and heart over hardware. In the stillness, we find the sacred.

It begins when we loosen our hearts and let go of old hurts, offering forgiveness not because it's easy, but because peace is the most precious gift we can share and receive. And it begins when we don't wait for Christmas to feel happy, but let it build up slowly with Advent reflections, candlelit carols, and small, quiet acts of kindness that ripple through the world like grace.

Letting Christ be born in our hearts means becoming His Bethlehem not just during Christmas season but every time we pick love over fear, kindness over arrogance, and optimism over despair. That is how Christmas lives on not in the calendar, but in us.

This Christmas, may your heart be the cozy manger where Christ finds room. May your home be filled with laughter, not just from parties, but from a sense of peace. May your present be wrapped in affection, not just wrapping paper. And may your spirit, like Mary's, softly say yes to God's invitation.

Let us not just celebrate Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. Let's make a room for Him in our hearts, our homes, and the world around us.

Merry Christmas and May Christ be born anew in you.

Friends, I am writing a sad, deeply moving story of a middle-class family, which truly touched my heart. Why a sad story at this joyful season? Hold on; it is a sad story, no doubt, but with a happy ending, at Christmas time.

Jamie, aged twenty two, completed his bachelor's degree in Computer Science and wanted to pursue his master's degree at Stanford University in the United States. He was always enterprising and self-centered. His parents, with great difficulty, arranged funds for his smooth passage to California.

While Jamie was busy pursuing his studies, his father, John, aged fifty five, was hit by a speeding truck while crossing the road. He was hospitalized with a broken spinal cord, paralyzed and was in ICU. After undergoing multiple surgeries, he was discharged after a month. All savings were exhausted in settling the huge hospital bills. His mother, Ruth, aged fifty two, decided not to disturb Jamie. So, Jamie wasn't informed of this tragic accident.

As days passed, his condition further deteriorated. John breathed his last in the arms of Ruth. She called Jamie, and from the other end, "Jamie informed his mother that he was unable to come home now, as he was in the midst of his semester exam." She said, "Okay, my son," and put the phone down, sobbing uncontrollably, looking at her dead husband lying on the bed. Neighbours gathered after hearing the news. She called for an ambulance for the funeral service. She had no money at home. So, she borrowed money from a neighbour, to cover the ambulance cost.

The ambulance stopped in front of the church. John's body, wrapped in a shroud, was wheeled inside the church. As Ruth was unable to afford the exorbitant charges for the Undertaker, she decided to give him a shroud burial. John was finally laid to rest.

After a month, Jamie arrived home. She embraced him sobbingly, and said, "Your dad waited till the end to see

you. He suffered a lot, my son. After a few days, Jamie informed his mother that she would accompany him to California permanently. To that, she replied, "Thank you, my son, you're now my only hope. Jamie sold the house and transferred all the money in his account. He arranged the visa and tickets and started packing his suitcase. The day arrived to leave for the airport.

Upon arrival at the airport, Jamie took his mother to the waiting lounge in front of the check-in-counter and asked her to sit there with her cabin bag, while he would check in the other baggage. Over an hour passed but there was no sign of Jamie. No passengers were seen around her. Her welled up eyes desperately searched for her son. She heard the final call announcement for Air India flight AI179 departing to California. Panic set in. Still there was no sign of him. She froze in her seat not knowing what to do. The boarding gate closed.

An airline staff member approached Ruth, and asked her, "Do you need any help, and why are you waiting here?" Ruth replied, "My son was supposed to pick me up." The airline staff member then asked her, "Can you please show me your ticket and passport." Ruth opened her handbag and handed over the documents to her, who then asked Ruth to follow her to the counter. She asked, "What is your son's name?" Ruth replied, "Jamie D'Souza." After checking the manifest, she sadly informed her, "Your son has already boarded the flight, which departed just ten minutes ago." After hearing this, Ruth stood there shocked and speechless, tears rolling down her cheeks. The airline staff member slightly brushed her shoulder, offering a glass of water. When Ruth regained her composure, she said, "Jamie, why did you do this to me?" Despite all the embarrassment, she prayed for his welfare and safe journey.

As she was leaving, the airline staff member approached her again, and said, "Ma'am, you still have a valid ticket and visa. We can put you on to the next flight tomorrow." To this, Ruth replied, "My son, Jamie, whom I truly loved all my life, is now a grown up man. He doesn't need extra baggage to carry." Stunned by her words, the airline staff member saw her slowly walking towards the airport gate, totally devastated.

Despite losing everything in life, she took courage and managed to get admission to the old age home. She worked tirelessly and took care of other residents, giving a helping hand to the Sisters.

In mid October 2018, a church group visited the old age home. Jamie's friend, Philip, aged 32, who was part of the group, spotted Ruth standing among the residents.

Seeing Philip, she quickly covered herself and disappeared from his sight. After a while, Philip approached Ruth, and said, "Why are you hiding from me, and why are you here?" Ruth replied, "Fate, my son. I lost Jamie to this materialistic world. As long as he is happy, I have no regrets." She then narrated her story to Philip.

Before leaving, Philip approached the Sister-in-Charge, and asked whether he could take Ruth home. She hesitated at first, and then asked him to come back again to complete some internal formalities. She also informed Philip that adult adoption is illegal in India, but we will find some ways. In the meantime, she will check with Ruth whether she is okay and ready to be part of your family.

Finally, Philip brought home his mother, Ruth, on Christmas Eve. He had two beautiful children, a boy aged five and a girl aged three. He said to them, "Listen up, I present you 'Grandmom' as a special Christmas gift." Hearing this, her eyes filled with tears of joy, and with folded hands, slightly bowing down, she said, "Thank you, my son. You gave me your beautiful family as a return gift," and kissed his forehead. The children came running, hugging and screaming, "Merry Christmas, Grandma." The air in the room was filled with joy and happiness. Ruth stood there right in front of the crib and saw Baby Jesus lying in the Manger. She said, "Thank you, Jesus. You have been very kind to me," and bowed down to kiss Baby Jesus. She then turned to her newfound children and grandchildren, and wished them, "Merry Christmas."

Representation of Kohima Diocese at the Family Commission, NEIRBC Annual Meeting 2025 – Plan & Strategies at the Regional Level

The Annual Meeting 2025 on “*Plan & Strategies at the Regional Level*” organized by the Family Commission, North East India Regional Bishops’ Council (NEIRBC) was held from 15th to 17th October 2025 at Inspiration, Joyti, Kharghuli, Guwahati, Assam. The Diocese of Kohima was represented by Sr. Rita MSMHC, Mr. Mengukhrietuo Marcus Dzüvichü, and Mr. Zasi Stany Rume.

The meeting commenced on 15th October with the arrival and registration of delegates. The Holy Eucharist, celebrated by Most Rev. Bishop Joachim Walder, Chairman of the Family Commission, NEIRBC, marked the official opening. During the Mass, Mr. Mengukhrietuo Marcus Dzüvichü had the privilege of proclaiming the First Reading. This was followed by an ice-breaking and introductory session led by Rev. Fr. George Jarain, Regional Secretary of the Family Commission.

The second day began with Morning Prayer and Holy Mass, again presided over by Bishop Joachim Walder. After breakfast, Rev. Fr. George Jarain presented the annual reports from the dioceses covering September 2024 to August 2025 and outlined the Vision and Mission of the Family Commission:

- Vision: Christ-centred, loving, joyful, witnessing families and nurturing life.
- Mission: To build vibrant, faith-filled Catholic families across North East India, following the model of the Holy Family of Nazareth — by teaching faith and moral values, accompanying families in times of crisis, and deepening Catholic family spirituality.

Subsequent sessions focused on *Plans and Strategies at the Regional Level*, facilitated by Fr. George Jarain, in the presence of Bishop Joachim Walder and Rev. Fr. Arul Raj Gali, CSC, Executive Secretary of the CCBI Commission for Family.

In the afternoon, Fr. Arul Raj Gali conducted enriching sessions on pastoral development, coordination with regional commissions, and Remote Marriage

Preparation. The session highlighted the three stages of preparation — *Remote*, *Proximate*, and *Immediate* — and emphasized the role of the Church and community in nurturing couples for Christian marriage. The final day, 17th October, opened with Morning Prayer and Holy Mass presided over by Bishop Joachim Walder. Fr. Arul Raj Gali then delivered two thought-provoking sessions on *Family, Vocation, Conscience & Love* (based on YOUCAT) and the CCBI Pastoral Plan, focusing on the journey towards a synodal Church mission, strategic planning, and pastoral priorities for the family apostolate.

The meeting concluded with a feedback session, fellowship lunch, and departure. The representatives from Kohima Diocese expressed that the gathering was both spiritually enriching and pastorally enlightening, providing deeper insights into:

- Strengthening Catholic family life,
- Enhancing strategic pastoral planning, and
- Promoting collaborative evangelization efforts across the dioceses of North East India.

It was indeed a blessed opportunity for the Kohima delegation to participate, learn, and contribute to the collective mission of building Christ-centred families rooted in faith, love, and service.

Pope at Audience: Advent Teaches Us to Wait in Active Hope

At a special Jubilee Audience on Saturday, December 7, 2025 Pope Leo XIV emphasised that the Advent Season invites Christians to practise active waiting—a hopeful engagement that prepares hearts for Christmas and recognises Jesus' presence in daily life.

Delivering his catechesis, the Pope said Advent calls believers to stay attentive to the "signs of the times", noting that preparing for the Lord's coming requires effort and awareness. He stressed that the fulfilment of creation and its redemption is not a passive expectation. "God always seeks to involve us in His work," he said, adding that participation lies at the heart of Christian hope. "God involves us in His story, in His dreams. To hope, then, is to participate."

Reflecting on the Jubilee theme Pilgrims of Hope, Pope Leo XIV insisted its message must endure even after the Jubilee concludes at Christmas. He urged Christians to journey through life with hope, not by standing idle "with our hands in our pockets", but by actively taking part in God's mission.

Christians, he said, are called to "read the signs of the times", recognising God's action in historical events—an insight highlighted by the Second Vatican Council. God is not distant from the world, he explained. The Incarnation teaches believers to seek Christ "in the realities of life", with intelligence, heart, and sleeves rolled up.

The Pope pointed to the example of Alberto Marvelli, a young 20th-century Italian member of Catholic Action. Marvelli dedicated himself to rebuilding Italy after the devastation of the Second World War and ultimately lost his life when he was struck by a military truck while cycling to a rally. His witness, Pope Leo XIV said, shows that the world improves when people willingly give up comfort and choose what is good. "This is participation," he added.

Concluding his address, the Pope invited Catholics to examine whether they truly place their talents at the service of others and the Kingdom of God. Active hope, he said, is a divine gift. "No one saves the world alone. Not even God wants to save it alone: He could, but He does not want to, because together is better."

Greetings from Sharing!!!

We remain deeply grateful for your gracious support and time. Your inspiring journey—from strong family foundations to your life of faith, your achievements as a model featured in India's Next Top Model, and your growing influence on social media—continues to motivate many, especially the youth.

1. Could you tell us about your family and the ways in which they have shaped your character, values and outlook on life?

I come from a very humble family. My parents got married at a very young age and did the best they knew how to do with what they had. They may not have been very religious in a conventional sense, but they were deeply sincere, hardworking, and rooted in strong values. That itself became a lesson for me growing up. My brother and I were raised in a Catholic school and later spent our growing up years in a convent hostel system. Daily Mass became part of our routine, almost unintentionally at first. At that age, we may not have fully understood the depth of it, but those years planted something steady within me. Looking back now, I realise how much those early experiences shaped my sense of discipline, reflection, and faith. I am deeply grateful for that foundation.

2. How would you describe your faith journey, and how has it guided and strengthened you through personal or professional challenges?

My faith journey has been very real and evolving. It has not always been perfect or easy. There were phases where faith felt natural and comforting, and other times when I questioned, struggled, or simply felt tired.

During my most difficult personal moments, faith became less about answers and more about holding on. Prayer gave me the strength to sit with

discomfort, to slow down, and to trust even when things did not make sense. It reminded me that I do not have to control over everything, and that surrender is sometimes the greatest strength.

3. What inspired you to step into modelling and the digital space as a social media influencer, and how did your path unfold toward India's Next Top Model?

Modelling began as a form of self expression for me. I was drawn to creativity, movement, and storytelling more than the idea of fame.

Over time, I realised that this space also carried responsibility, especially when people begin to look at you or relate to your journey.

India's Next Top Model was a turning point. It tested my resilience, confidence, and emotional strength. The experience taught me how to show up fully, even when I felt unsure. It helped me understand who I am beyond appearances and external validation.

4. Which experiences, whether uplifting or challenging, have had the most profound impact on your development as a model, influencer, and as a person?

Some of the most defining moments in my life came through challenges rather than achievements. Experiences of loss, betrayal, and emotional exhaustion forced me to pause and reflect deeply on who I am and what truly matters to me.

At the same time, moments where someone shared that my work or presence helped them feel calmer, understood, or inspired were incredibly grounding. Both the difficult and uplifting experiences shaped me into someone more aware, compassionate, and honest.

5. Working in the dynamic world of fashion and media, how do you remain authentic, spiritually grounded, and faithful to the values you were raised with?

I try to remain honest with myself above everything else. The industry can be fast and demanding, but I consciously remind myself of where I come from and what I stand for.

Faith helps me pause and realign when things feel overwhelming. I do not aim to be perfect, but I do try to be sincere. Staying grounded for me means choosing peace over constant approval, and authenticity over performance.

6. What message or guidance would you offer to young people who look up to you, especially those striving to follow their dreams while remaining rooted in faith and good values?

I would tell young people that it is possible to dream big and still stay rooted. You do not have to compromise your values to succeed.

Faith does not stop you from growing. It helps you grow with clarity and patience. Trust the process of your life, even when things move slowly. Be kind to yourself, stay honest, and remember that setbacks are often lessons shaping you for something deeper.

7. Any final word of encouragement or reflection you would like to share with the readers of Sharing?

Life is not always smooth or predictable, but faith teaches us how to remain steady within it. Even during uncertainty, there is meaning and grace at work.

I hope readers are reminded that growth does not always come loudly. Sometimes it comes quietly, through reflection, resilience, and trust.

Wherever you are in your journey, you are not alone. Blessed Advent seasonal.
